## FROM THE DIRECTOR

It was 1914 and a committee of 10 residents began meeting to discuss forming a public library for York's residents. Eight years later, they voted to incorporate as the York Public Library Association and on June 7, 1922, the state of Maine made it official. The first order of business: build a library.

Fast forward a hundred years and we had a celebration to plan! A myriad of celebratory activities kicked off in May - all of which you can read about later in this report.

2022 was also a big year for the Town. With the completion of York's inaugural Climate Action Plan (CAP), ambitious goals were set to cut 50% of greenhouse gas emissions by 2035 and 100% by 2050. The Steering Committee identified one of the first steps down that path as getting residents on board.

Simultaneously, one of the objectives set forth in the Library's Strategic Plan involved turning our gaze toward energy efficiency and sustainability.

I am happy to say YPL took meaningful steps this year to serve as a community leader in sustainability. In line with the Town's plans to get residents on board, the library formed strategic partnerships with local organizations to launch a series of programs on the various causes and outcomes of climate change and what we can do to prevent and/or mitigate them. Speaking of programs, though we had begun to hold some in-person, fall and winter brought a new Covid variant and with it, another surge, necessitating a return to virtual-only events. This was reflected in our door counts - an average of 5000 people/month - which may seem high but in actuality is 30-35% lower than normal. Interestingly, the number of items those visitors checked out was on par with pre-Covid years. This combination was a trend played out in libraries around the state.

Though door count was down and checkouts remained level, program attendance numbers (virtual and inperson) increased — significantly so in the Children's Department. The same goes for Summer Reading registration and the number of kids we engaged with during outreach visits to area schools, pre-schools, and summer camps. All of this suggests that residents were beginning to venture forth and looking to connect with others.

Another resulting factor of Covid was people working remotely, meeting virtually, or a hybrid of the two. To help facilitate this, we sound-proofed the study rooms and purchased hardware to make the Wheeler Room a hybrid meeting space with targeted gift funds and a grant from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Lastly, our strategic planning process identified an additional community need: Monday service hours. Thanks to taxpayers approving our budget, on January 3, 2022, we opened on Mondays for the first time in

We continue to be blessed with a wonderful team of dedicated volunteers (70+!) and staff. Volunteers work on a myriad of tasks: everything from reshelving materials to shelf-reading; serving on the Art Committee to plan exhibits throughout the year; dedicating extensive amounts of time and expertise to serve on our Board of Trustees; helping the Youth Services Department in assembling materials for future programs or make and take crafts; sorting through book donations, curating the ongoing book sale, and keeping it stocked with fresh content. And we can't forget the annual book sale!

YPL is also fortunate to have a fantastic staff. It was 2016 when we lured former Assistant Director Sudie Blanchard back to YPL as a part time Librarian, but... she retired this year. For good, she said. Though we were sad to say goodbye to her, as well as Library Assistant Bridget Carr, we were thrilled to name Katie Arey as Head of Youth Services, and hire Devin Burritt as our Reference & Technology Librarian and Tasha Spuches as a part time Young Adult Librarian. We also welcomed Library Assistant Emily Benson and Student Library Clerks Dewey Matthews and Zoe Noonan.

It was certainly a busy year with a centennial celebration, programs, initiatives, partnerships, and services. We made impressive in-roads in working toward both our-and the Town's-sustainability goals and as we continue down that road, we are looking forward to discovering new and creative ways to "Enrich lives; Inspire minds; Create community."



## **EYE ON CLIMATE**

In partnerships with York's Climate Action Plan (CAP) Committee, York Land Trust, Camden Conference, Maine Humanities Council, and two other area libraries, we launched a virtual program series, **The Future is Now: Our Climate Realities**, on topics related to climate change, including "The Power of Salt Marshes in a Changing Climate"; "Indigenous Climate Justice"; and "Climate Courage and Mental Health."

We dedicated a portion of our website as a hub for all things sustainability. The site includes information about local organizations working toward the goals set forth in the CAP, and a video archive of all related library programs.

Looking inward, the library began planning for future energy-saving measures for the building, including the installation of an Electric Vehicle (EV) charging station in our parking lot; consideration of a solar array on our roof; and replacing our propane-dependent HVAC system.

### **PROGRAMS**

With the pandemic almost at the point where we could see it in the rear view mirror, we were able to host more in-person programs. To compare to the previous year, we hosted 179 programs and events, attended by 5,250 community members.






# **Shining a Light on Literacy**



The day of our 100th Birthday Party arrived, a gorgeous summer day, and hundreds of attendees of all ages enjoyed live entertainment, food trucks, a book sale, lawn games, raffles, and giveaways. Maine's Secretary of State Shenna Bellows joined us to present YPL with a Proclamation officially certifying our 100 years of public service.

Our fête concluded in September with the presentation of a beautiful Centennial Quilt designed and created by town residents. Each square represents some facet of the library, and for the perfect touch, local quilt historian and restoration expert Betsy Telford-Goodwin donated original 1920s fabrics from her personal collection to incorporate into the guilt. The guilt was permanently installed in the library's lobby for all to enjoy.




